



Three banners were prepared and signed by our priests and parishioners.
























#### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAPAL MASS

# FR AUGUSTINE TAY CELEBRATES HIS 50TH SACERDOTAL ANNIVERSARY



G lory and praise to the Lord on this great milestone of his priesthood vocation.

Fr Augustine Tay had been appointed Parish Priest at St Joseph's Church (Bukit Timah) from 1986 to 2002.

He celebrated his 50th Sacerdotal Anniversary at our Parish on Sunday, 24 November 2024 at the 5.30 pm evening Mass. The Mass was concelebrated by fourteen priests with religious and seminarians in attendance.

In the homily, Msgr Peter Zhang summed up Fr Tay's contributions to the parish into three key areas, namely, "Hardware, Software and Heartware", which left an indelible mark on our community. **HARDWARE** – Fr Tay's vision, devotion and perseverance had enabled the construction of the Rectory (which houses the priest residence and parish office), the Parish Community Hall (where catechism classes, parish events and functions are held), the SJC Kindergarten (now the Little Shepherd's Schoolhouse), the Chapel of the Resurrection for funeral wakes and a columbarium.

The installation of the life-sized outdoor Stations of the Cross, which became the impetus for devotion and pilgrimage had also been undertaken by Fr Tay during his tenure.

**SOFTWARE** – Fr Tay had commissioned renowned Chinese artist, Prof Wu Yong Liang, to produce the priceless masterpieces of Christian paintings in Chinese ink-brush style. Two of these paintings, depicting the life of St Joseph, "The Nativity" and "The Flight to Egypt" have been installed at the wings of the Church.

Other works of art are located in the Parish Community Hall, "The Wedding Feast at Cana"; and at the Chapel of the Resurrection, "The Resurrection of Jesus." Another masterpiece,

"The Beatitudes" was presented to then Pope John Paul II and is now kept at the Vatican Museum. One copy has been retained at the Parish Office and it is now a third-class relic, signed by St John Paul II.

Fr Tay is a true 'man of culture' in every sense. Not only is he a devoted custodian of Catholic tradition, faithfully preserving the rich heritage of the traditional Latin Mass, but he also tenderly nurtures the cultural roots of the Chinese community by continuing to celebrate Masses in Teochew.


HEARTWARE – This is of utmost importance as it refers to the heart of a person. Msgr Zhang explained that he has known Fr Tay since the 1990s when he began his studies at the SFX Major Seminary, which was then located at Punggol. Knowing that the foreign seminarians do not return to their countries during the seminary breaks or holidays, Fr Tay took the initiative to invite them to stay at his Parish.

He also invited them to join him and his family for the Chinese New Year reunion dinner. This act of kindness left an indelible mark on Msgr Peter as it speaks of Fr Tay's loving concern for others, especially for the Chinese seminarians as the Chinese New Year reunion dinner is a special time when one thinks of family.

Prior to the final blessing and dismissal, Fr Tay encouraged the faithful to place their trust in the Almighty Father as he did to overcome overwhelming odds. He cited the instances where he had to deal with the issues of squatters on church land, rebuilding the old rectory which was unsafe and fixing the roof leaks in church with meagre funds available at that point of time. Fr Tay also added that the Good Lord watched over him as he went through those difficulties.

Many thanks to Fr Tay for his years of dedication and care towards his duties. May the Good Lord continue to bless and bestow upon Fr Tay the gifts that would enable him to remain in good health to carry out His work.

onversations on popular apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary often revolve around Lourdes in France and Fatima in Portugal, followed by Medjugorje in Bosnia-Herzegovina and Akita in Japan.

Curious about apparitions in other countries, I researched resources such as Miracle Hunter, the Ultimate Guide to Marian Apparitions, The World of Marian Apparitions, The History and Science Behind Marian Apparitions and the International Marian Research Institute of the University of Dayton in the United States of America.

I learned that there were over 2000 claimed apparitions in Europe, the Americas, the Middle East, Africa and Asia under various categories: Traditionally Approved (by local priests with building of a sanctuary followed by affirmations from bishops and Popes); Bishop Approved (investigated by local bishops and accepted as authentic without Vatican recognition); Bishop Approved with Vatican Recognition (only 16 apparitions are in this list, including Lourdes and Fatima but excluding Medjugorje and Akita); Coptic Approved (investigated by the Coptic Orthodox Church in Egypt); and Unapproved Apparitions since 1900 (with negative or no decisions made, plus some subsequently approved for private Faith Expression).

The Traditionally Approved category features apparitions in Asia that I have not been aware of! The Bishop Approved category includes Our Lady of Akita. Since bishop affirmation or approval has been accepted as authenticating the apparitions, I will focus on the Traditionally Approved/Bishop Approved apparitions in India, the Philippines, Vietnam, China and Japan.

#### INDIA

There were seven interesting apparition cases of Our Lady in India. In AD 105, the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to hungry shepherd children in the Indian town of Kuravilangad in Kerala. She transformed stones to bread, quenched the thirsty children with water from a miraculous spring which had sprouted in the drought-stricken area and requested a church to be built in the location. The Kuravilangad Church website describes the Blessed Virgin Mary as 'Muthiyamma' in Tamil and her other miraculous interventions.

Three supernatural events were reported in Vailankanni, a town in Tamil Nadu. The first was on 8 September 1550, when the Virgin Mary appeared to a poor shepherd boy who was carrying milk for his master and asked him for milk to feed her child Jesus. When the shepherd's master did not believe the story, the milk overflowed from the pot. The second was at the end of the 16th century, when Our Lady appeared to a crippled boy who was selling buttermilk to travellers and asked him for a cup for her baby Jesus. Our Lady healed the boy and told him to pass on a message to a Catholic man to build a chapel in her name. The community described Mary as 'Our Lady

of Good Health'. The third was on 8 September 1650, when Portuguese sailors were saved from a violent storm through Mary's intercession. The sailors then transformed the thatched chapel into a stone chapel. On 3 November 1962, Pope John XXIII raised the Shrine to the status of a Basilica.

Two other healings occurred, one in Goa in 1624 and the other in Vellangany in 1895. In Goa, Our Lady cured a Jesuit priest who had been poisoned and had asked for her intercession at his deathbed. In Vellangany, Our Lady healed a 12-year-old boy who was gravely ill.

The seventh apparition case was in Kallikulam in 1939 when Our Lady appeared to six young people. This incident was initially categorised under Unapproved Apparitions but was later approved for Faith Expression by Bishop Roch Victoria, who went to the apparition hill and blessed it with a commemorative plaque in 1941. A grotto was also constructed on the hill to honour Our Lady's apparition.

#### **PHILIPPINES**

Seven Marian apparitions were reported in the 17th century. In 1610, a farmer who was worried about raiders destroying his crops put his trust in God and Mother Mary to protect him and his family. Walking home one day, he saw a mysterious light and then the Virgin Mary on a cloud above a treetop, with a Rosary in one hand and her child Jesus in another hand. The Virgin Mary called his name and asked that a church be built on the site. The community initially referred to the Virgin Mary as Our Lady of Manaoag, which means The Lady Who Calls, and eventually Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary of Manaoag.

In 1611, Our Lady appeared twice to a slave girl in a stream of the Bingsacan area. First, Our Lady told her to return after joining the Confraternity of St Augustine. Second, Our Lady healed her eye illness so that she could see clearly. Miraculous healings from the stream water were reported after the apparitions.

Our Lady also appeared to two Jesuit priests. In 1616, Our Lady appeared to Jesuit priest Fr Francis Otazo when he prayed to her for protection against





pagans. Our Lady appeared again when he was having doubts about his mission and encouraged him to continue his apostolate work. In 1632, Our Lady appeared to Jesuit priest Antonio Andrade when he prayed for her intervention after being poisoned. He was healed and carried on with his missionary work.

Two intriguing apparitions also happened, one in Caysasay and the other in Cavite City.

In 1619, a native slave girl was gathering firewood and fetching water when she saw radiating brilliance from a gap in a rocky landscape. Many people then went to see the Lady of Caysasay and reported miraculous healings from the spring water. In 1692, the Virgin Mary appeared on a beach of Canacao Bay and then left behind a framed image of herself. Fishermen took the image to their parish priest who placed it in the church and subsequently built a chapel for it.

A Marian apparition case in the 20th century went through what some observers described as a 'ping pong' process of approval and rejection. Sr Teresita Castillo from the Carmelite Order in Lipa City reported several times in 1948 that she had encountered the Blessed Virgin, identified as 'Mediatrix of All Grace'. Local Bishop Alfredo Verzosa y Florentin approved veneration of the Mediatrix but six other bishops in the Philippine Church ruled negatively in 1951 and banned public display of the Mediatrix statue. In 1992, Archbishop of Lipa, Mariano Gaviola, lifted the ban after reports of rose petals falling from the sky into the Carmelite Convent and children seeing the statue of the Mediatrix coming

to life. With increased devotion to the Mediatrix, Archbishop Ramon C Arguelles lifted the ban on public veneration of the Mediatrix in 2009. Then in 2010, Vatican announced that the Lipa apparitions were not 'supernatural'. Despite Vatican's non-recognition, Archbishop Raymond C Arguelles stated in 2015 that the Lipa phenomenon was supernatural and 'worthy of belief'. The Holy See countered by declaring the archbishop's decree as null and void. Finally, the Catholic Bishop's Conference of the Philippines issued pastoral guidelines in July 2016, emphasising that private devotion to Our Blessed Mother Mary, Mediatrix of Grace, should not relate to the reported Lipa apparitions in 1948.

#### VIETNAM

When the Nguyen Dynasty persecuted over 100,000 Catholics in 37 parishes in 1798, many Christians took refuge in the La Vang jungle of Quang Tri province but died from the cold weather, wild beasts, starvation and sickness. When the survivors prayed the Rosary one night, the Blessed Mother appeared with the child Jesus and two angels. She told the survivors to boil the leaves of nearby trees and use the liquid as medicine.

The refugees built a chapel to honour the Blessed Mother, described as the Lady of La Vang. The location became a centre for pilgrims despite persecutions, which ended in 1886. The chapel evolved into a church and in 1961 Pope John XXIII elevated it to a Basilica. On 16 December 1997, Pope John Paul II celebrated the 200th Anniversary of the apparition.

#### **CHINA**

During the Boxer Rebellion in 1900, 10,000 soldiers attacked the Dong Lu mission set up by Vincentian priests. When hundreds of Catholics prayed for the Virgin Mary to save them, she appeared dressed in white in the sky. The frightened soldiers fired wildly and fled when a fiery angelic horseman chased them out of the village. The Dong Lu community built a church to thank the Virgin Mary for saving them.

Pope Pius XI blessed the official image of Our Lady of China in 1928 and approved Dong Lu as an official Marian Shrine in 1932. In 1942, Pope Pius XII included its feast day in the Catholic liturgical calendar. During the Vigil Mass on the Feast of Mary Help of Christians on 23 May 1995, the sun spun from right to left with rays of different shades appearing in the sky. People reported seeing Our Lady, the Child Jesus and the Holy Family.

#### **JAPAN**

Sr Agnes
Sasagawa of the
Handmaids of
the Eucharist in
Akita reported
Marian apparitions
between 1973 and
1981. Soon after
Sr Agnes joined
the convent in May
1973, she saw a
bright light from the
chapel's tabernacle,
received a stigmata

in her left hand, encountered her guardian angel frequently, saw a wooden statue of the Virgin Mary ablaze in light, found a hand of the statue bleeding and witnessed the statue weeping many times (the statue wept 101 times, even when Sr Agnes was not present).

Although Sr Agnes was deaf, she received messages from the bleeding statue of Our Lady to pray the Rosary and do penance for world peace. A Korean woman was healed of her brain cancer after praying to Our Lady of Akita in 1981 and Sr Agnes herself regained her hearing permanently in 1982. In 1984, Bishop John Shoojiroo Ito of Niigata declared the statue tears to be supernatural and approved veneration of Our Lady of Akita. Sr Agnes died aged 93 on 15 August 2024 on the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

#### FINAL WORDS

The Lipa case in the Philippines could have been a forerunner of Vatican taking centralised control on apparition approval. In May 2024, Vatican announced new norms stipulating that the Pope must approve before any bishop announces a supernatural phenomenon. It would be interesting to see if other Asian Marian cases would be recategorised under the new norms.

# Vegetable Garden @ St Joseph's Church

o you know there is a vegetable garden in St Joseph's Church compound located right behind the Rosary Garden?

Two volunteer gardeners look after the vegetable garden: Francis cares for the plants grown from soil while Paul oversees the hydroponic vegetables.

When the gardeners increased the production of vegetables in 2023, our parish decided to offer the vegetables to poor families supported by the Society of St Vincent de Paul (SSVP) Conference of St Joachim. The monthly distribution of fresh vegetables to the poor families started in February 2024 after the parish had finalised logistics for harvesting and collection.

The vegetables from the church garden are harvested a couple of days before or on the day of aid distribution on the first Sunday of the month when the Friends-In-Need (FIN) supported by SSVP come to collect their financial aid. The vegetables are packed by SSVP members for FIN to pick up readily. Vegetables include kailan, Hong Kong choy sum, bai cai, basil, sweet potato leaves, Brazil spinach as well as herbs like basil and mint. These fresh vegetables are gladly taken up by the FINs, especially for those who cook for their family daily.

Currently SSVP Conference of St Joachim serves 122 FINs in 50 poor and underprivileged families residing in St Joseph's Church parish, i.e. areas including Bukit Panjang, Choa Chu Kang and Teck Whye.









n a bid to better appreciate the various religious communities in Singapore, our GLAD (Golden Living Active Disciples) seniors visited the Russian Orthodox Church on Wed 24 July 2024.


Our gracious host, Bishop Pitirim Dodenko, gave us a tour of their Church and addressed all the questions from our curious seniors who were intrigued about their prayers and practices.

The Russian Orthodox Diocese of Singapore was established on 12 October 2007. The Parish Church of the Dormition of the Theotokos was established first at Hillview, then moved in 2014 to the present location at 110 Highland Road. A larger premise is now under construction, and will be on the grounds of a Russian Cultural Centre. The Russian Orthodox community has a following of a few hundred believers.

The visit was an eye-opener for us and helped us to better appreciate other religions in our midst.







he Regional Biblical Commission (RBC), under the auspices of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Malaysia-Singapore-Brunei, dedicated the month of July 2024 as "Bible Month".

The Parish responded by organising a slew of activities, including a Bible Month promotional video, to commemorate the occasion:



#### **SCRIPTURE SERIES**

Fr Ambrose Vaz has been conducting weekly sessions every Thursday to walk through the bible with our seniors. This project was initiated in August 2023 and the group aims to complete reading the entire bible with the guidance of Fr Vaz. All are welcome to join the group.

#### HOW TO PRAY THE BIBLE

Over two sessions, our parish Pastoral Teams Coordinator, Jane Lau, introduced parishioners to two different methods of praying with the Bible – Lectio Divina and Ignatian Contemplation. Participants were also led into a prayer experience where they tried out these methods while reflecting on Scripture. Feedback from participants was that they found it helpful to have different ways to enter deeper into the Word of God.

#### **ART & FAITH TALK: ACTS OF THE APOSTLES**

Patricia Tan uses painting to depict the stories covered in the entire book of the Acts of the Apostles. She couples the art works with spiritual reflections to enrich our experience with God.

#### INTRODUCTION TO THE BIBLE

We were privileged to have Fr Ambrose Vaz give an "Introduction to the Bible". He touched on how to go about reading the Bible; on the various types of bibles available as well as how to select one that is suitable for you.

This was held in conjunction with the Bible Fair run by the Daughters of St Paul. The bookshop displayed 23 types of bibles for parishioners to view after the talk.

#### **BIBLE REFLECTION AND SHARING**




#### **BIBLE QUIZ**
















In the second half of 2024, the Family Formation team continued to line up a series of events to help families in our parish come closer to God and each other. Apart from organising family-based events, the team also conducted sacramental preparation for parents for infant baptism, first confession and organising intercessory prayers for children during the Primary School Leaving Examination (PSLE) period.



#### **FAMILY MOVIE NIGHT**

In collaboration with Catholic Family Life (CFL), the team organised the second movie night in July. During the PLSE preparation period, the Family Formation team organised 9-weekly online Exam Novena on Monday evenings and Saturday mornings between July-September to pray for all the children taking exams to receive God's protection, peace and blessings. Prayers were also offered to St Joseph of Cupertino, the patron saint of exams and students. Between 10-15 families joined the weekly online Novena and six to eight families participated in the prayer vigils during the PSLE days.

#### POST-PSLE P6 CAMP

A post-PSLE camp was jointly organised with our team of catechists from Primary Catechesis and facilitated by Bro Dominic Yeo-Koh and Mr Zerah Goh from Montfort Centre from 12-14 October. Using the main scripture of finding Jesus in the temple (Luke 2:41-52), the camp helped the P6s at this time of transition to discover the Jesus in them and who Jesus is for them.









Parents joined in the second day of the camp for a family picnic, gained insights on building a domestic church and together with their children took part in a 3D craft activity to build a strong and beautiful church. This day helped the parents to discover the Jesus in each of their child.

The transition from childhood to adolescence is a significant milestone for both child and parent and their relationship with God. On the last day of the camp, the children joined in the World Café on the 10 Principal Virtues of Mary. Each child also took away a little memento on the 10 virtues of Mary to help them increase in these virtues, just as the boy Jesus "increased in wisdom and in stature and in favour with God and man." (Luke 2:52)

Parents gave positive feedback that the children enjoyed the programme and that it was good family bonding time. So, 2025 P6 parents, do lookout for the camp registration! Camp will be from 11-13 Oct 2025 – mark your calendars!

#### **POSITIVE PARENTING WORKSHOP**

The last parenting activity organised jointly with CFL was on positive parenting — 'Beyond I Said So'. This was an experiential workshop to step into the child's world

and understand which discipline methods would work for children. Parents were taught positive discipline tools to be better equipped to handle the daily parenting challenges and importantly to build a relationship with children that is based on mutual respect and connection. Twelve families joined in this workshop.







#### **CARMELITE MONASTERY**

¬he sky was overcast on the Saturday morning when I arrived at the Carmelite monastery. I was there to join the St Joseph's Church Chinese RCIA group on a one-day local pilgrimage. Coincidentally, the coach carrying 31 other participants arrived at the same time. Monsignor Peter Zhang, together with the catechumens and sponsors alighted and we began our first stop.

We ascended a flight of stairs and entered into the tranquil sanctuary of the Carmelite Sr Linda received sisters. us and led us into the chapel where we were briefed by Sr Jacinta. We were then led to a small hall where Sr Anna. separated from us by a panel of bars, very patiently and cheerfully answered all our questions. Why would anyone in their right mind consent to live behind walls for the rest of their life? How many Carmelite sisters are there? How do they spend their time? Could they ever step out from the cloister?

For a moment, the veil was lifted. We learned that there are twenty sisters living in the monastery, the youngest is 30 years old and the oldest is 98 years old. They live a simple communal life cloistered from the outside world. Other than

going for medical appointment, they do not step out of the monastery. Their days are steeped in prayers, contemplation, silence and work.

#### AGAPE VILLAGE

It was raining cats and dogs when we descended the monastery to board the coach to our next destination. Enroute, we recited the Rosary and belted out hymns in high spirits. Before long, we reached Agape Village located in Toa Payoh. We were greeted by two Caritas staff Susan and Gail who gave us a briefing on Caritas, their mission and work.

After a sumptuous bento lunch, we proceeded to tour the premises. We were shown the facilities run by various charity organisations under Caritas. There is even a dental clinic! They reach out to all the needy regardless of race and religion. Their areas of work include childcare, student care, counselling, physiotherapy, the handicapped, elderly and home-bound. It was indeed an eye-opening experience for me to see the scope of charity work covered.

#### CATHEDRAL OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD


Our final destination is the Cathedral of the Good Shepherd, the first Catholic Church built in Singapore. Our arrival there coincided with a wedding taking place in the cathedral. Unperturbed, we broke into two groups and followed our respective guides, Tracey and Keith, to tour the Cathedral's Museum. There we feasted our eyes on the artefacts, liturgical articles and pictures exhibited.

We learned that the cathedral was named Good Shepherd to commemorate Bishop Imbert who, together with two fellow priests, were martyred in Korea in 1839. We also learned about the missionary priests who left their homeland to spread the gospel to Asia, including Singapore; as well as the missionaries who built churches and schools in Singapore.


As soon as the wedding was over, we were given the green light to enter and tour the cathedral. As we entered the cathedral, I was drawn to the pieta sculpture by Michaelangelo. Who can stand unmoved before the sorrowful mother holding her dead son in her arms - beyond grief, beyond blame, knowing that her son has to lay down his life for our salvation.

Contemplating the pieta, images of the Carmelite sisters flashed through my mind. They have left everything and laid down their lives. Likewise, all missionaries, priests and religious, past and present, have left everything and laid down their lives.

As Christians, we too are called to deny ourselves and lay down our lives. It is heartening to know that many of our brothers and sisters are doing so at Caritas.
